The stories we tell with our lives, then, aren't meaningless absurdities, tragic in their brevity, but rather subplots of a grander narrative, every moment charged with significance, as we contribute our own riffs, soliloquies, and plot twists to the larger epic, the Holy Spirit coaxing us along with an ever-ebullient, "And then? And then? And then?"

This is my last letter to you, my community at First Congregational Church of Ripon.

I have accepted a full-time Chaplain position with ThedaCare, which begins late February. My last Sunday as Pastor of First Congregational Church will be February 16, 2025. Our family will remain in Ripon where we have made a wonderful home and our kids have built

incredible friendships. I look forward to new ministry opportunities in Chaplaincy, and yet at the same time feel bittersweet in saying goodbye to First Congregational Church, which has been so much a part of my life and my family's lives over the last five and a half years, and where we have made lasting friendships and

so many good memories.

And so I write to you one last time.

But this is not the last time you will receive a letter from a pastor, a theologian, a preacher or teacher of the church. Because your story is not done yet.

There are so many things I wish to write to you about, and too many things I feel I could say about our

life and ministry together these past few years.

But the most important thing I need to say is "thank you." You are a congregation that matters to this community, and you have done and will do great things. You leave me inspired by what you say and what you do.

You matter because of the extravagant way you welcomed me and my family to Ripon on a hot summer afternoon on July 14, 2019. You brought food and (cold!) drinks, and more than enough help to move an entire household of belongings into our new home in less than an hour.

You matter because you welcomed the community into our church, for the Ripon College Center for Diversity and Inclusion, Choral Union Choir, Campus Ministry, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Ripon Area Community Theatre, ADVOCAP, Girl Scouts, Narcotics Anonymous, Kiwanis, PEO, Rotary STRIVE Program, Crossroads Academy and the new Hillside Academy

from the Ripon Area School District, Wisconsin Conference UCC Historical Committee, and for opening the sanctuary to the Green Lake Festival of Music, the Ripon High School Baccalaureate service in 2024, and the annual Ripon College Baccalaureate services, greeting and worshipping together with faith communities different from our own.

You matter because you built a downtown playground in our church backyard allowing neighborhood families and children from the Boys and Girls Club a safe place to play.

You matter because of the hospitality shown to the LG-BTQ community, for becoming the 1,587th Open and Affirming church in the United Church of Christ in 2019, for all you do to support the high school Social Justice Alliance (SJA), for being a founding member of the Ripon Area LGBTQ Pride Rally, for offering sanctuary to the Ripon College Queer-Straight Alliance (QSA), and for your commitment to make all people are respected in our community.

You matter to an incredible number of children and youth, who learned compassion and justice from you through Sunday School lessons, events and retreats, and who had the privilege of leading a worship service each fall.

You matter to the Northeast Association of the Wisconsin Conference UCC, modeling for our sister churches the way we can advocate for justice, thrive in a rural oriented community, and seek to better our community through engagement and action.

You matter because you said "yes" to feeding the hungry through a simple Community Dinner each month, pivoting when COVID required us to get creative, and modeling how to do this ministry with our fellow area churches year after year. You helped bring together 4 other churches to consistently provide 1 free dinner each week for people in need of food and fellowship.

You matter because of the ways in which you show up in our community and side with the oppressed and marginalized, such as attending the Black Lives Matter rally downtown in 2020, joining in a car caravan with handwritten signs to visit members of our church during COVID in a drive-by "We Care" event, helping the homeless, knitting prayer shawls and baby hats, plant-

ing a pollinator/native garden on church grounds, writing to the editor of the Ripon Commonwealth about social issues and matters of our community to promote positive change, and attending the Ripon Pride Rallies year after year proclaiming God's love for all people.

These are a few of the stories I take with me. They are the stories I will remember you by. And there are MORE stories just like these that you know and by which you will remember our ministry together.

We are a church made up of stories. No singular story defines our congregation, but all of our stories reflect the magnificent love of God.

I take my leave, inspired by the good I have seen in each of you, inspired by the love you share with one another and this community, and inspired by your willingness to let the Holy Spirit gather you and toss you and set you free upon the world. I am inspired by this faith community.

So, go, and be all that God has called you to be.

Love one another.

Love God.

Walk with Jesus Christ.

Trust the Holy Spirit.

Tell people they matter.

Go to marches and rallies.

Keep raising the rainbow above our doors.

Sing in the church, and on the streets.

Tell people that love wins.

Laugh at our mistakes.

Share your tears and your joys.

Leave the light on for the stranger.

Read good theology AND embody good theology.

Be a people of resurrection.

Be of one heart, one mind, one spirit with one another. Be the church.

May we inspire love and justice all our days. Let that be our story.

Shawl Ministry Caps

The Shawl Ministry team has chosen as its next project, making simple winter hats to put in our giving box for anyone who needs a little extra warmth during the cold and dark months of our Wisconsin winter.

During WWII those at home supported the war effort, in part, by knitting socks, hats, and mittens for soldiers, refugees, and medical staff. A classic pattern was Beanie No. 212, a watch cap knit in a simple stitch pattern (see image) with a folded edge for extra warmth. The basic pat-

tern can be knit using a circular needle and worsted weight yarn. Simple decreases make a star pattern in the crown of the hat. Once you know the basic pattern, you can make variations with different stitch patterns, cables, stripes, etc.

We meet on Wednesday mornings at 9:30 AM in the chapel for tea, conversation, and knitting, but all are welcome to participate in this project whether they attend those meetings or not. Copies of the pattern are available here, and along with lots of donated yarn, in the chapel for anyone who wants to participate in this project. We will also have plastic bags and tags for finished hats with these supplies. If you are feeling a need to do something to make the world a warmer place, this project may be just what you need.

If you prefer to crochet, here is a pattern for you.

Look for an announcement of a coffee-hour session to learn how to make these hats.



Hopes great and small

"The Christian lives with three hopes, two great and one small," writes Bryan Wolfmueller. In his "Wednesday What-Not" blog, the pastor explains: "Our first great hope is in Christ our Redeemer, whose death and resurrection are our forgiveness, life, salvation and great hope. Our second great hope is in Christ the King returning soon to judge the living [and] the dead, and establish the new heaven and earth where the righteous dwell. This is our hope for the resurrection and the life of the world to come."

Amazingly, there's more! "Sandwiched between these two great hopes is our small hope, our lesser hope, our hope for tomorrow, our hope that we might begin to love and serve our neighbor, and do some little something to bless the people around us," Wolfmueller continues. "This is the hope that energizes our vocations, that motivates our love, and that is the reason we make New Year's resolutions. We hope that we might do something a little bit better tomorrow than we did yesterday."

The pastor concludes, "If this was our only hope, it would be despair. But sandwiched between the love of Christ and the joy of the resurrection, this little hope is wonderful, and certainly not to be despised."

January 2025 - Fresh Water for Flowers by Valerie Perrin


